## The Good News of the Gospel: Christ Cast His Seed for Everyone

This is one of the most popular parables known, but unfortunately one that is either misunderstood or whose negative aspects are highlighted. There is too much focus on the seeds that do not grow. The Sower is the Lord. Christ, the Son of God went out from the His Father and entered the human race. This is the meaning of the words from the gospel, "A sower went out to sow his seed" (Luke 8:5). The 'seed' is the life-giving teaching of the gospel. "Some fell on the path, some seed fell on the rock, some fell among the thorns, and some seed fell on good soil." We represent the path, the rock, the thorns, and the good soil. Christ cast His seed everywhere. The good news of the Gospel is not a secret. The good news is not confined to just one group. Christ cast His seed for everyone. God desires the salvation for all human souls.

How many times have we heard of the seed that does not grow. The negative news of the church is often times highlighted: we are losing children, church attendance is down, baptisms and weddings are on the decline, drugs and alcohol abuse are on the rise, and the Orthodox Church leaders are watering down the faith. We should be very concerned about the spiritual health of the church and not close our eyes to the evil one attacking us. Let us not become negative, and lose hope, especially for those who may not be growing at the moment. It is wrong to believe that Jesus Christ, the Divine Sower, would sow His seed

where no fruit would be produced. The Lord sows His seed, offers us His love, regardless of our weaknesses and sins. Never think the Lord is wasting His time, offering His seed, His love to a person we may think is a waste of time. Jesus cast His seed to the faithful and the unfaithful. He has hope for every human being. We commemorate the Martyr Longinus on the 16th of October. He was the Roman soldier who pierced the side of Jesus when He was on the cross. Longinus, once a centurion soldier, became a martyr for Jesus Christ.

Any human being can be converted for God. This is meaning of this parable. St John Chrysostom wrote, "The Lord simply and indifferently cast His seed. The ordinary farmer would say placing where the Lord sowed it would be pointless and fruitless. The Lord is not just any old farmer." If we read carefully and prayerfully we discover Christ seed even grew in difficult conditions. We have the potential to grow with Christ. What must I do to grow? We need to start listening to God. Begin reading the holy scriptures daily. Start the morning with prayer, and close the day with prayer. Place the Sunday Divine Liturgy at the top of your list, and parents, do not allow sports and hobbies to take your children away from the Sunday Liturgy. Too often we begin and end our day with CNN, Fox news, ESPN Sports, and hundred plus cable channels. Are they really helping us be-

come better people? Jesus ended the parable, “When He had said these things He cried, “He who has ears to hear, let him hear!” Jesus is aware of the negative and evil influences of the world with the goal of taking us away from God. He cries out for us with the love of a concerned Father.

The Lord’s desire for us is not only to listen to Him, but to know Him. To know God is to experience Him. “and I lay down My life for the sheep. And other sheep I have which are not of this fold; them also I must bring, and they will hear My voice, and there will be one flock and one shepherd.” (John 10:15)

# Spiritual Life in the Family

**The more one grumbles, the more one falls into ruin**  
(excerpt from *Family Life* by St. Paisios of Mt. Athos)

## Geronda, why do people grumble and how can it be avoided?

Grumbling is caused by misery and it can be put aside by doxology (giving praise). Grumbling begets grumbling and doxology begets doxology. When someone doesn't grumble over a problem troubling him, but rather praises God, then the devil gets frustrated and goes off to someone else who grumbles, in order to cause everything to go even worse for him. You see, the more one grumbles, the more one falls into ruin.

Sometimes the devil deceives us and makes us unable to be pleased with anything; however, one can celebrate all things in a spiritual manner, with doxology, secure God's constant blessing. Look here, I know someone on Mount Athos who, if it's raining and you tell him, "It's raining again," he will start saying, "Yes, it's always raining; we are going to rot from all the humidity." And, if after only a little while the rain stops and you tell him, "Well, it didn't rain too much after all," he'll say, "Yes, but what kind of rain was that? Everything will dry out ..." You can't say that he's crazy; it's just that he's grown accustomed to grumbling. It's strange to see a rational man thinking irrationally!

Grumbling carries a curse. It's as if someone is cursing himself, and then the wrath of God comes upon him. I knew two farmers in Epeirus. One of them was a family man who had a couple of small fields and who entrusted everything to God. He worked, as much as he could, without anxiety. He would say, "I'll do as much as I can manage." Occasionally, some of the hay bales would spoil in the rain because he didn't gather them in time, while other bales were scattered by the wind; and yet for all things he would say, "Glory to You, O God!" and everything went well for him. The other farmer had many fields, cows, and so on, but no children. If you asked him, "How are you doing?" he would invariably respond, "Forget about it; don't even ask!" He never said, "Glory to You, O God"; he was always grumbling. And so that you will see - sometimes a cow of his would die; sometimes one thing would happen to him, sometimes something else. He had everything, but he made no progress.

This is why I say that doxology is a great matter. Whether or not we taste the blessings God gives us depends on us. But how are we to taste God's blessings, if He gives us, for example, bananas and we're thinking of whatever better things some ship-owner might be eating? How many people there are who eat only dry bread, but praise God say and night and are nurtured with heavenly sweetness! Such people acquire a spiritual sensitivity and are acquainted with the caresses of God. We don't understand these things, because our heart is caught up with filth, and we are not satisfied with anything. We don't understand that happiness is in eternity and not in vanity.

## A Saint is Not Remarkable on the Surface

A saint is not remarkable on the surface; all his riches are internal, in his soul. A peasant came a long way to the monastery to see St Sergius. When he asked for the abbot, he was told that he was working in the garden. The peasant went off to the garden and saw a man there in poor and dirty clothing, hoeing along with the other workers. The peasant returned to the monastery dissatisfied, thinking within himself that the monks were making fun of him, and repeated, that there might be no mistake, that he wanted to see the famous holy father, Sergius. Sergius arrived back at the monastery just then, and welcomed the peasant, serving him at table. The saint looked into the heart of his guest, and saw there were thoughts about himself. To quieten him, he told him that he would see St Sergius if he waited a little. Just then, a prince arrived at the monastery with his nobles. Both the prince and the nobles bowed low to Sergius and asked his blessing. The monks then removed the peasant from the room to make room for the guests, and this peasant looked with wonder and afar, and peered to see that which he had spurned the sight of from nearby. He chided himself for his ignorance and was deeply ashamed. When the prince had departed, the peasant quickly went up to the saint, fell at his feet and asked his forgiveness. And the great saint was gentle with him, and said: 'Don't grieve, my son; you thought a true thing of me, reckoning me as nothing, while others are deluded in thinking me something great.' - St. Nikolai Velimirovich

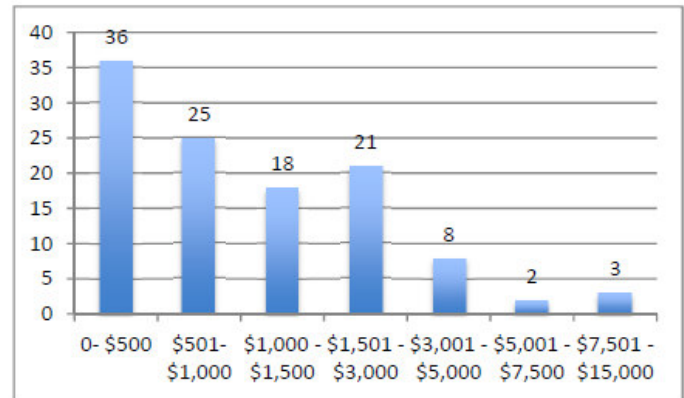

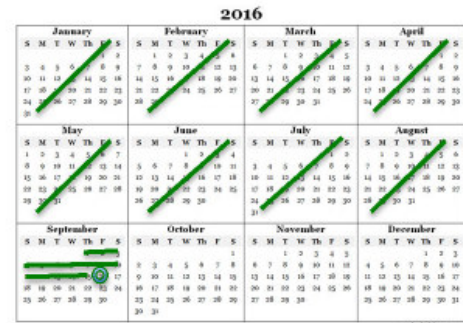

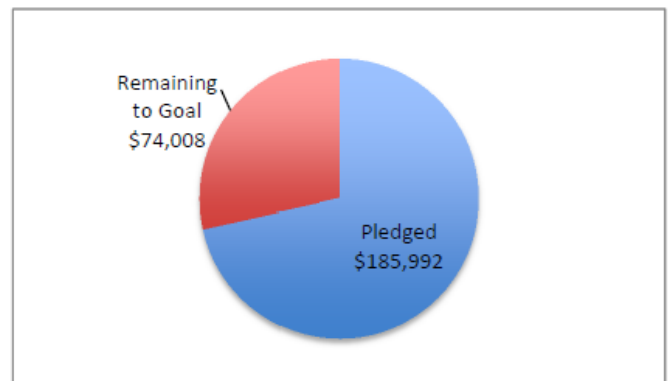

# Sts. Peter & Paul Orthodox Church

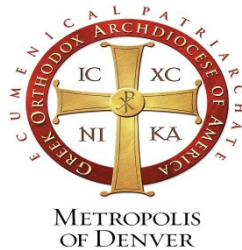
